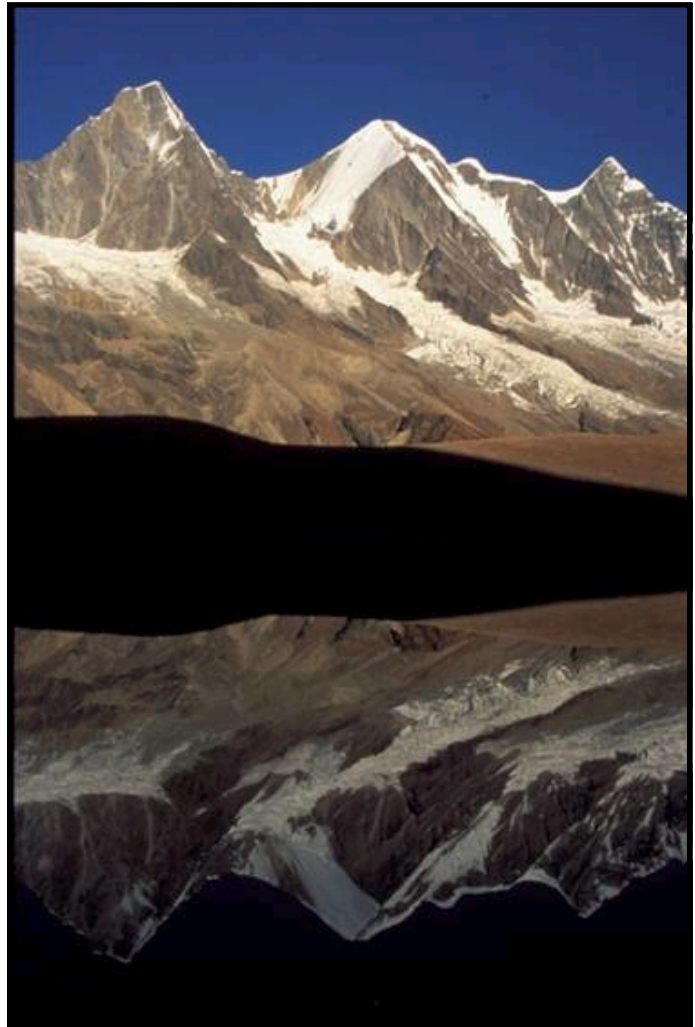

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Lower Malemute Access Update

Following meetings with BC Rail, Squamish climbers plan to a written plan to BC Rail, which will outline the issues from the climbers' perspective, detail access options, and suggest strategies for a solution. For now, the entire Lower Malemute remains under a voluntary closure. (The Upper Malemute is open.) It is very likely there will be a permanent closure of some climbs in the Penguins in Bondage area, some fencing, signage, and new access routes. B.C. Rail cannot pay for fencing the entire length of the cliff, but appears willing to consider partial fencing. A substantial fund-raising campaign seems likely once a solution has been identified. All climbers should keep in mind that B.C. Rail has the authority to close most of the climbs adjacent to the tracks, and all existing foot approaches, but has chosen instead to discuss the issues to see if a positive solution can be found. GRADING GUIDELINES

- A - *Less than 6 hrs travel/day (not strenuous)*
- B - *6 to 8 hrs travel/day (moderately strenuous)*
- C - *8 to 12 hrs travel/day (strenuous)*
- D - *More than 12 hrs travel/day (extremely strenuous)*
- S- *Slower-paced trip, (suitable for seniors)*

- 1 - *Gentle slopes. Travel on trails over fairly level terrain.*
- 2 - *Moderate slopes. Travel may be off trail. Intermediate skiing ability recommended. Easy climbing.*
- 3 - *Travel in mountainous terrain. Steep forest and glaciers probable. Backcountry equipment and intermediate skiing experience required. Moderate climbing.*
- 4 - *Travel over difficult mountain terrain. Advanced backcountry and mountaineering experience, ability and equipment required. Advanced ski mountaineering or moderate to difficult ice or mixed climbing. Ropes and belays required.*
- 5 - *Technical ice or mixed climbing. Advanced climbing experience required.*

Non-members are welcome to participate once or twice before joining, and are accepted on a space available basis.. Everyone is welcome to attend our meetings at 7:30pm in the Floral Hall of Van Dusen Botanical Gardens, W. 37th Ave. & Oak St in Vancouver on the fourth Tuesday of every month (except July, Aug, Dec).
